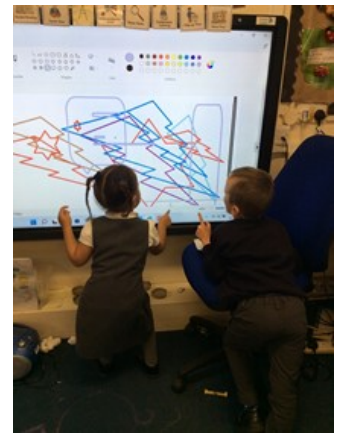

The next show and tell session will take place on Wednesday 23rd of November.

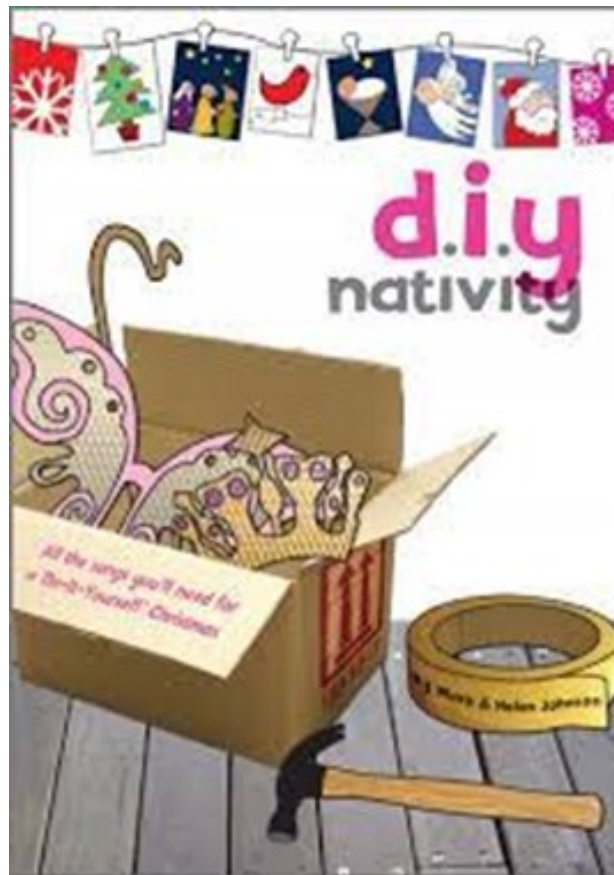


Message from Mrs Bramwell—Oak Class

Did you know how the digestive system works?

Did you know the adult human eats approximately 500 kg of food per year? If humans did not eat at all, their body would be unhealthy and we would probably die. If you would like to learn for more about the digestive system keep on reading.

Down to the stomach

Once you have picked the food up off your plate (or whatever you eat your food off) you would put the food inside your mouth where your teeth will crush the food up into little bits like crumbs until the bits are small enough to go down your oesophagus, once your food is small enough then your saliva will push the food down your oesophagus that will take the food to the stomach. After the your muscles will take the food from the food.
