


Message from Mr Huxtable—Willow Class

Have you ever wondered the difference between knowing and believing? This is the question that Willow Class are looking at answering in their R.E lessons this half term. As part of their learning, the children will have the opportunity to engage in debates with their peers around many questions that seem simple at first but they also encourage deep critical thinking and reflection on how our own thoughts and opinions are formed.

As a class our lessons will focus on enabling the children to build an awareness of different perspectives about whether some things can be proven. We will also discuss the influence on moral decision making of factors such as experience, family, history, culture or community.

Many of our philosophical discussions begin with a "thunk" a series of questions taken from a book that really make you think deeply about a simple concept. If your child has enjoyed their philosophical thinking, I would encourage you to explore thunks more as they can be a fun way to encourage reasoning and critical thinking.



This week, Willow have also continued to examine their dreams and goals and ask why are they important? We looked at scenarios and situations where we saw other children succeed or achieve and asked ourselves why does it seem that others always seem to find things easier or achieve well and what is a 'go getter'? We came to the conclusion that it is a good idea to set milestones or targets to help us recognise those steps to success. Perhaps your child might like to discuss with you their dreams and goals that they set out for themselves since we started this area of learning.

In our PSHE lesson this week we focused on what would our dream jobs be like? We read a job description for a Teacher and then attempted to write our own for our possible future career.
