

Message from Mrs Hall—Willow Class


What has happened to the weather? One minute we are enjoying hot sun the next we are all putting our wellies and coats on!

This week in Willow, we have begun planning our big projects in Geography and Science. We have been researching our topic using fact files, search engines and books. Next week we will use our research to create a persuasive poster.

In English, we have continued working on our poetry topic. Our new class book is *Cloud Busting* by Malorie Blackman. We began by looking closely at the cover and blurb and making some predictions and inferences. We then delved into the first chapter and had some good conversations about where we think the story is going and what it may be about. We also looked at the unusual structure of the text. Did you know poetry doesn't always rhyme and sometimes it sounds like a story?

We thought carefully about the verbs we can use in dialogue. Our favourite phrase right now is 'SAID IS DEAD!'

One of our activities was to decide how many different verbs we could use in a dialogue sentence.



In maths, we have continued looking at adding and subtracting across 10 and 100 using various methods. We have thought about the maths skills previously learnt such as number bonds and how they can help us. For example: we can add or subtract to get to the nearest 10 or 100, and then use our number bonds to work out the rest of the journey to the answer. We discussed how many people will use different methods to work things out so it's good to learn as many as possible and then decide on our favourite; whatever works best for you.

Some exciting news for you. Next half term I will be starting a new after school club. This will be a science club, focusing on experimenting and investigating. It will be a very hands on experience and I am sure we will have a lot of fun. So if you have a love of science but would rather spend more time using materials and tools and less time writing then this is the club for you. I look forward to seeing you there.

Message from Mr Einton – Chestnut Class

And so the curtain draws on the penultimate week of the half-term... It seems scarcely possible but here we are! And what a creative week it's been... Not least in outdoor learning lessons on Tuesday when the children sculpted snakes using modelling clay and natural materials they found on the grounds. I've attached photos of a couple of them to show you all, but I was incredibly impressed with everyone's efforts, not just those shown here.

We also started drafting our free-verse poem in response to Valerie Bloom's *Two Seasons* and I was blown away by the efforts of the class. I genuinely think that writing good poetry is one of the hardest things to do and they've given it a red-hot go and achieved some excellent results.

In mathematics, we have finished looking at addition and subtraction and I'm happy with the general levels of confidence throughout the class. We now move on to the next two of the basic operations - multiplication and division. After completion of this unit after half-term, we will have looked at place value and each of the four basic operations so will be well set to move onto fractions and the like.
