## Message from Mrs Hall—Willow Class

Welcome back Willow. I hope you have all had an amazing half term. Unfortunately I have been hit with Laryngitis and so have had a week without a voice, which has certainly been challenging. But fear not, we got through didn't we. Well done everyone for battling through a very unusual week. Hopefully, my voice will be back to its old self soon. Thank you for being patient with me this week.

We have a Greek theme this term. In history, we will be investigating Ancient Greek life. We looked at timelines this week, and had a go at understanding dates. Initially, we were baffled by the BCE and CE dates. But after some practice ordering events we finally cracked it. We ordered some historic events and artefacts and looked at how historians and archeologists use timelines when investigating their finds and piecing together periods of history.

In English, we are studying Greek myths. We discussed what a Greek myth is, what their purpose is and who they were written for. Theseus and the Minotaur was our first myth, which we used to get an idea of how they are structured. We then began reading The Adventures of Odysseus and created a story map for the first part of the journey. Today, we will be looking closely at the mythical creatures found in Greek myths and creating a character description for our Cyclops from the story.

In maths, we are continuing our journey through addition and subtraction. We have been working hard to conquer the column method, especially those tricky exchanges. Willow class have been working very hard and practicing their skills in their books.

## Message from Mr Euinton - Chestnut Class

Welcome back everyone! It's been stormy outside but nice and calm inside and I've been impressed with how quickly the children settled back into school routines. It's been very productive too...

In English we've published the poems that the children worked so hard on last term and started looking at our next piece of written work. We've looked at Odysseus's encounter with Polyphemus and Beowulf's with Grendel and created our own monsters which will become the antagonists to be defeated by our own heroes. We will be looking to use a variety of literary techniques to create suspenseful and entertaining stories over the coming weeks. In mathematics, we have continued our unit of study of the four basic operations and have been focusing on multiplication - this week we have built up to multiplying 4-digit numbers by 2-digit numbers and we will be looking at using these skills to solve more complex problems next week before starting to think about rules of divisibility.

In the foundation subjects, the children have consolidated their understanding of the effect of the transatlantic slave trade on modern-day Brazil by producing double-paged spreads and had some fascinating discussions about the nature of suffering in preparation of our consideration of the Four Noble Truths and Eightofld Path of Buddhism.
